Dear Friends,

This year has seen the birth of a royal baby. If you were given the task of finding a gift for him, what do you think would be appropriate? Certainly he will need all the things that every baby needs. But if you were to get him something special what would that be? Most people would probably think of something very expensive or something highly unusual. That was certainly the case when a group of Babylonian philosopher scientists brought gifts to the infant Jesus.

There is a degree of mystery as to what drove them on the long journey from their homeland to Israel. It is guite possible that their studies had led them to the Hebrew Scriptures and the great hope of Israel that one day a King would emerge who would hold the key to all the mysteries of life. But how did the Magi connect this hope with the unusual cosmic disturbance that occurred on a particular night? We do not know but the 'star' spoke to them of the King's birth and the need for them to make the journey to honour him.

They brought gifts. There is no explanation why they brought gold, frankincense and myrrh. Perhaps the gospel writer believed that no explanation was needed. Gold, highly valued, durable, to wish the infant King a long reign. Frankincense, used in religious ceremonies, to wish the King a close walk with his God. Myrrh? This was used to preserve dead bodies. What has this to do with the freshness and the promise of new life? Were the Magi given some insight into the nature of this King's mission? That his death would be in some way significant?

All we know is that all of the gifts were appropriate. This King was destined to reign forever and ever. Of all human beings he was closest to God, indeed God in the flesh. His death opened the way for humanity to be renewed in body, mind and spirit. There is a sense in which the gifts told the whole story of the King. How close are we to that story?

In T.S. Eliot's poem Journey Of The Magi they returned to their homeland changed, 'no longer at ease here, in the old dispensation/With an alien people clutching their gods.' Will there be a change in us as once again we are brought to the familiar story this Christmas? The story of a God who became one of us, who lived our life, who died to open up the way for us to be at peace with God. who has risen to assure us that our journey of life will continue beyond death.

Wishing you quality time with the story this Christmas,

Kimo Revisited

A small group set out on October 10th on a long trip to Lima; in the event we reached our hotel in the Peruvian capital 24 hours after leaving home. We had an early start for our bus journey to Kimo and were delighted to be there at last after travelling well almost 8,000 miles.

The boys gave us a tremendous welcome - big hugs and enormous smiles for complete strangers! We were very impressed with the houseparents, Henry and Eva, who set the tone of the home. The other staff are also very caring and obviously play an important role in the running of the home - they include a care assistant, a teacher who visits after school to give extra help and a social worker who also comes parttime.

There are now twenty-one boys in the home; extra costs incurred because of the extra staff who are mandatory according to new government guidelines mean that it is too expensive to take in more boys at present, even though there is accommodation for forty. Despite the frustration of empty spaces the staff are delighted that the twenty-one are at Kimo.

Their ages range from 4 to 15. This range also reflects more changes in government rules because it is now forbidden to take boys from the streets - this is kidnapping- even if it is evident that they are homeless and in danger! The new regulations mean that boys are now sent to Kimo by the police or the social work department so the little boy of four came after both his parents went away and a neighbour reported it.

Another difference from the previous system is that occasionally some boys receive visits from a parent, usually their mother; in the past no boy had any contact with either parent.

The boys' schedule is very full; they get up at 5.30 on school days, leaving for school at 6.50 to get the cage across the river and then a bus to the nearby town where they attend a state school. After getting back for lunch at 2.15 they have a variety of activities including doing dishes and some other chores washing their school uniform, for the bigger boys. They have time to play and watch TV, and do their homework, just like children here. At the home they have two dogs and seven delightful puppies (five of which will be given away soon!) The menagerie also includes a sheep, twenty hens, a few very vocal cocks and a dozen chickens.

We were assigned several tasks - it was a work party,after all! We were asked to sand and varnish two of the wooden-clad buildings; these were definitely in need of some TLC which we were pleased to provide. We had taken gloves and masks which were really useful. It was quite hard work, especially because of the heat and humidity. But we had the prospect of cold showers to refresh us afterwards...... At the end of our visit our work had made a big difference - we were just sorry not to have time to do the same to the other buildings.

It was quite emotional to leave Kimo but it had been a real thrill to be there and to see the boys whose lives would have been so very different if the home had not been built.

Henry and Eva asked us once again to thank the members of St. Paul's for your generosity and concern for the boys. Those of us who have had the privilege of going to Kimo feel so grateful to have had this experience. Please remember the boys and the staff in your prayers, that God will bless everything that goes on there and that these boys will grow to love and follow Jesus.

We will have a Coffee Morning in March in aid of Kimo; I will show photos there and speak about our visit, but in the meantime some new photos are on display on the Kimo board in the Large Hall. Thank you again on my own behalf for the marvellous interest and support of so many members of the congregation for the project from the very beginning - it has been truly amazing!

Carers Link

Caring for someone can feel like a huge responsibility, and it is easy to feel anxious when faced with the maze of services and benefits available, wondering how to access the help needed by both the carer and the person being looked after.

Watchnight Service Offering

The offering this year will go towards the Barnabas Fund who seek to help Christian children orphaned by the brutal war in Syria.

Christian youngsters are especially vulnerable as Islamic rebels are targeting minority communities. Many have suffered the loss of both parents and dozens are children of martyred Christians.

In refugee camps there is lack clean drinking water and medical care. Lack of immunisation has resulted in the recent polio outbreak. Children are often malnourished, some dying of starvation. Christian girls are especially vulnerable to kidnap and sexual abuse.

With the start of winter, the suffering in Aleppo is especially hard as there is no electricity or any other form of heating. The under 10s are especially vulnerable and in need of warm clothing. Many children are mentally disturbed children having been traumatised by the horrors of war. Barnabas is providing support to nearly 300 Christian orphans of whom 10% are disabled, This includes warm winter coats, milk for under 2s and training in trauma counselling for church leaders and others.
