The blog is profound, moving, sensitive, humbling and intelligent (as we might expect from the Rev. Fergus C. Buchanan), and has touched a great many lives, not least among some who are themselves going through the mill.

I commend this blog and would encourage as many are as able, to follow it. It can be found at https://fcbuchanan.blogspot.com/2019/03/ You will find here that Fergus continues to minister to you, even though he is absent from work for now.

Please join me in praying for a speedy return to health for Fergus, giving thanks too for the Lord's healing gift of modern medicine. Join me too in praying for Gabrielle and all of the manse family at this time, that they would feel upheld, and continue to know the Lord's strength and blessing at this time.

Holy Week Services

The Holy Week services will be in St. Paul's Church this year with the theme "Words from Jesus on the cross". Once again local ministers will be preaching each evening. The Offerings will be donated to the work of Glasgow City Mission.

Monday 15th April - Forgiveness - Luke 23:32-34

"Father, forgive them, for they do not know what they are doing" – Jesus revealed that those who crucified Him were not fully aware of what they were doing. And yet ignorance of divine truth did not mean that they were absolved, so Jesus' prayer of forgiveness as He suffered and was mocked is an expression of the compassion of divine grace.

Tuesday 16th April – Love – John 19:16-27

"Dear woman, here is your son!" – Most of the disciples had fled, except the disciple that Jesus loved (probably John). When Jesus saw him with His mother, He committed His mother into John's care. Jesus was forging a new relationship between John and His mother, illustrating the new family that He was creating.

Wednesday 17th April – Salvation – Luke 23:35-43

"I tell you the truth, today you will be with me in paradise" – Jesus assured the criminals on the cross that when He died, they would be with Him in heaven. This was granted, because even at the hour of his death, the criminal had expressed his faith in Jesus, recognising Him for who He was as his Saviour and Lord.

Thursday 18th April – Separation – Mark 15:33-37

"My God, my God, why have You forsaken me?" – Jesus expressed His sense of abandonment as He was made to bear our sins and experience the Father leave Him for the first time in eternity. He was separated so that we need never face the same, as signified by the tearing of the curtain in the temple.

Friday 19th April (Good Friday) – Victory – John 19:28-37

"It is finished" – Jesus' last words (one Greek one) meant that His suffering was finished, and our salvation was accomplished. The work that His Father had given Him to do (to preach the Kingdom, to work miracles and to make atonement for the sin of His people) was done, accomplished, paid and fulfilled.


There will be a short service in the United Free Church on Saturday 20th April at 9.30am.

Guild News

At our last meeting in February, Val Brown, Church and Community Action Manager, spoke to us about the work of Christian Aid and we were pleased that representatives from our local and St Paul's committees for Christian Aid were



able to join us. Founded in 1945 by British and Irish churches to help refugees following the Second World War, Christian Aid, for over 70 years, has provided humanitarian relief and long-term development support for poor communities worldwide, while highlighting suffering, tackling injustice and championing people's rights as well as informing about, and campaigning against, climate change. Val told us about the work in Lebanon to provide sanitation, house-locks and social places for women to meet safely. She also described the ongoing work towards economic justice where in Bolivia, taxation has lifted people out of poverty. Also in Bolivia, Val mentioned the very successful solar ovens, which was a former Guild Project and which have given women freedom and an increased standing in decision-making within their societies. Val finished her presentation with a detailed glimpse of the Checkpoints in Bethlehem and an insight into the Israel/Palestine Conflict as well as how work is underway, through Christian Aid and other agencies, to *break the silence* and to build peace throughout the communities.

It was lovely to see so many people at our Coffee Morning on 2nd March. Pounds and pennies were spent at the stalls and pounds and ounces were gained eating the delicious home baking! Many thanks to everyone who contributed goods and baking, and to everyone who came along to make the Coffee Morning such a success.

On 4th March, Ann MacLeod gave us a fascinating account of her 2017 trip to India and illustrated her talk with wonderful photographs. Ann was part of a group of 16 travelling from the UK to visit various Traidcraft enterprises in and around the cities of Delhi and Calcutta. The itinerary also included visits to some of India's famous landmarks including the Taj Mahal, the Jewel Temple and the tomb of Mahatma Gandhi. During her time in India, she had the opportunity to visit Traidcraft Exchange shops and workshops to meet the workers and artisans, observing the skill involved in making jewellery, fine intricate needlecraft pictures, colourful leather purses and money boxes. Ann had brought an album to India with photographs of St. Paul's Traidcraft stall and it was lovely to hear that the ladies recognised some of the items they had made. Ann shared stories of the people she met and their appreciation of the jobs provided by Traidcraft. One lady was grateful that she was able to afford to send her three children to school.

Ann encouraged us to continue to support Traidcraft as our partnership does make a difference to so many people who would otherwise struggle to support their families. After the presentation, it was good to see a queue at the Traidcraft stall which Rosemary had arranged, and to see some of the items from Ann's presentation. The tills were 'ringing'!

We were very pleased to welcome back the very talented David Sturgeon on 11th March and once again, we thoroughly enjoyed his singing and stories which focussed on his early musical theatre experiences as well as songs from the good old days!

On 18th March, Stephanie Beglin spoke to us about the valuable service that the Ronald McDonald House provides to over 550 families each year from all across Scotland and also further afield. Established in 1996 at Yorkhill Children's Hospital, the Ronald McDonald House is now based near the Children's Hospital at the Queen Elizabeth University Hospital. Its purpose is to enable families to be near their seriously sick children, whilst enjoying a free, high quality home environment with en-suite bedrooms, living and play spaces as well as laundry facilities. The House is open all year round and the average family stay is about 30 days whilst the longest occupancy has been two years. Since opening in 1996, 11,000 families have benefited from staying there. It was clear from Stephanie's presentation and accompanying testimonies from parents, how essential this facility is in helping families to stay close to their sick children.

It costs £660,000 to run the Ronald McDonald House yearly and it is worth noting that it is a small independent Scottish charity. The House receives no government or NHS funding and relies solely on the kindness and generosity of donors and fundraisers to keep the doors of the House open, to provide families with a welcoming 'home away from home'. Stephanie also clarified the status of the Ronald McDonald House, Glasgow by telling us that they are endorsed but not funded by Ronald McDonald House Charities. The name Ronald McDonald House - is retained due to their original licensing agreement. We were all surprised to hear that the Glasgow House does not receive support via the McDonald's fast-food restaurants' collection boxes and sadly, this is a common misunderstanding.

Our final meeting on 25th March was our AGM, followed by Karine Davison who entertained us with Scottish street songs evoking memories of childhood for all of us.

The Guild Summer Outing this year is to Perth on Monday, 3rd June. The bus will leave Milngavie railway station at 11:00am and we will travel to Gloagburn Farm Shop for some shopping and a light lunch/tea/coffee before travelling to Perth where we will have the opportunity to do some further shopping! Following High Tea at the Royal George Hotel, the bus will bring us back to Milngavie railway station around 8:00pm.

We look forward to welcoming you to any or all of our meetings after the summer when we meet up again on Monday nights at 7:30pm in the Large Hall.



St Paul's Society £1 Cards



Moderator helps celebrate Glasgow radio station run by young people

The Moderator of the General Assembly has praised the work of a Glasgow-based radio station which is run entirely by young people.



Rt. Rev Susan Brown joined the team of Bolt FM as part of celebrations taking place over two weeks marking 18 years since it was founded. During this time it's hoped more than 250 young people will help to mark the anniversary.

Mrs Brown said: "It has been brilliant to take part in the celebrations marking 18 years of Bolt FM and be interviewed by some of the young people involved. We had some good conversations about the activities of Bolt FM, such as a trip to Zambia last year. I was also impressed at being asked some searching questions whilst live on the radio! I wish Bolt FM every blessing as they continue to engage and enrich the lives of young people in Glasgow."

The radio station was set up to bring groups of young people together from Royston and Blackhill, that due to territorialism couldn't be in the same room.

With gang fighting between the communities eliminated, this project has now expanded to 9 different communities across North Glasgow giving young people a voice.

Mrs Brown was interviewed by young people who took part in a programme linking the station with young people in Ndola, Zambia, through Chifubu United Church of Zambia.

Last year five of the station's budding presenters went to Ndola on a two week trip and put together a short documentary about their time there.

Bolt FM is part of St Paul's Youth Forum in Provanmill, which is designated a priority area by the Church of Scotland because it lies within one of the country's most disadvantaged parishes according to the Scottish Index of Multiple Deprivation.

The ethos of the station is empowering the community by creating "radio for young people by young people."

Over the years Bolt FM has allowed young people to meet and interview public figures such as members of parliament, and to visit the Houses of Parliament.

Book Group

We have been discussing *As the Women Lay Dreaming* by Donald S. Murray. This book deals with the tragedy of the lolaire, carrying men returning from the First World War, which ran aground in Stornoway harbour. The resulting loss of life was to devastate the island for a generation.



We felt the book was a good example of life on the islands at that time and the characters were authentic. The people were totally human and the story full of emotion. That said, this book was not what we had expected. It was well into the book before the tragedy was mentioned and a couple of us were surprised to discover that this was a work of fiction albeit based on historical fact. We did think however that this book was well worth reading.

Our next meeting is on Tuesday 30th April and we will be discussing *The Adventures of a Young Naturalist* by Sir David Attenborough.
