Dear Friends,

BBC Radio 4 are currently broadcasting the George Smiley stories of the novelist John Le Carre. The first of the novels was written in 1961 and the character of Smiley, the British spy, was designed to be a counterpoint to the more glamorous and charismatic James Bond whose novels were very popular at the time. While Bond would always stand out in a crowd Smiley was described by his wife, no less, as 'breathtakingly ordinary.' In appearance he seemed dull and uninteresting, and even the most expensive clothes, which he wore, failed to give him even a hint of smartness.

Yet behind it all there was a brilliant mind and a strong commitment, sometimes obsessive, to see a project through to the bitter end. Everyone agreed, even colleagues who didn't like him, that there was something special about George Smiley. As someone said, he was 'both brilliant and unremarkable.'

I think this sums up the post-Pentecost Christian community. This was a group of ordinary people, not many drawn from the upper echelons of society, certainly not the 'movers and shakers' of their day, but they made an impression at a deep level. It appears that there was a quality of life within their community which could not be found anywhere else. What was their secret?

The Acts of the Apostles speaks of their devotion to the apostles teaching, their commitment to worship and prayer, their care for one another and the miracles that were performed in their midst. All of this, however, was the outward evidence of something much more remarkable. These ordinary people had within them the Spirit of the living God. The Old Testament prophecy of Joel had promised:

I will pour out my Spirit on all people.
Your sons and daughters will prophesy,
your old men will dream dreams,
your young men will see visions.
Even on my servants, both men and women, □
I will pour out my Spirit in those days. (Joel 2: 28-29)

This was astonishing to the people of Joel's day, that the Spirit of God might dwell in the lives of even the most 'ordinary' of people, but it happened on the Day of Pentecost and it continues to happen in the lives of all those who place their trust in Jesus Christ. That is how the Spirit comes to people here and now. Not by special techniques, not by spiritual disciplines, not by exercising superior moral standards, but by trust in Christ. This is what Paul is referring to when he reminds the Christians in Thessalonika:

You became imitators of us and of the Lord; in spite of severe suffering, you welcomed the message with the joy given by the Holy Spirit. (1 Thessalonians 1: 6)

If we have any aspirations to achieve the quality of life shown by the post-Pentecostal Church we have to begin here.

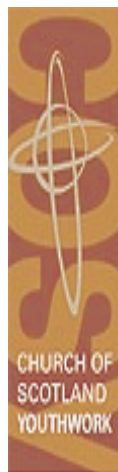

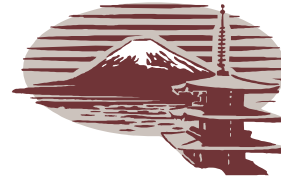
CoSYA is for young adults who have a connection to the Church and are aged between 16 and 25. Youth workers are welcome to attend the event to support their young people.

gregation would like to make some contributions. Favourite choices would be football strips and shorts or trousers - they need not be the latest fashion! Stationery for use in school is also very welcome because, although schooling is free, materials have to be provided. Musical instruments have been very useful in the past and simple games would also be welcome.

We will be grateful for your prayers while we are away - July 5th-19th - and also that the work may make good progress with the boys soon being welcomed.

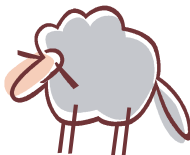

Special Commission on Same-sex Relationships

The General Assembly of 2009 appointed a Special Commission on Same-sex Relationships and the Ministry with the following remit:

“A Special Commission composed of nine persons, representative of the breadth and unity of the Church, to consult with all Presbyteries and Kirk Sessions and to prepare a study on Ordination and Induction to the Ministry of the Church of Scotland in the light of the issues (a) addressed in a Report welcomed by the General Assembly of 2007: “A challenge to unity: same-sex relationships as an issue in theology and human sexuality”, and (b) raised by the case of *Aitken et al v the Presbytery of Aberdeen*, and to report to the General Assembly of 2011.

In seeking to fulfil its remit to consult with all Presbyteries and Kirk Sessions the Special Commission prepared a Consultation Paper for consideration and response by all Presbyteries and Kirk Sessions by 31 May 2010.

In order to prepare St. Paul’s response a Special Meeting of the Kirk Session was held on Wednesday 19 May 2010, attended by 68 elders.

Following debate and consideration of the matters raised and the questions posed in the Consultation Paper, a secret ballot took place with each Elder completing anonymously a voting paper. The response to the principal issue of whether people in same-sex relationships should be ordained and inducted into the Ministry of the Church of Scotland was as follows.

Stuart Matthews, Minister, Maryhill Parish Church

Last time I wrote for this magazine I was introducing myself as a student to serve and learn with you over the session 2004-05. With my studies concluded, many of you will know that I was ordained as an Associate Minister into Maryhill Parish Church. Well, four years on and with a great deal of experience of ministry under my belt I'm due to be inducted as the Parish Minister for Maryhill. I feel very privileged to be able to 'stay on' and to serve this church and community in this most challenging and wonderful part of Glasgow.



When I saw you last we were a wee family unit with a babe in arms. Since that time we've come to recognise that our lives – as so many of you warned me – would never be the same again! Last year we were just becoming rather comfortable with two children and dare I say it, were 'coping' rather well, when another came along! Ben McBeth Matthews, baptised just last month, arrived much as his sister did, that is that he came quickly, but he also arrived early – one month early to be precise. Very uncertain and difficult days greeted us on his arrival and we couldn't believe that we couldn't take him home with us. He spent a very long month in the Special Care Baby Unit at the Queen Mother's Hospital. It's incredible to think back and to reflect on the fragility of life and on all the other babies who were Ben's roommates, each one in a glass box only to be picked up or handled every three or four hours if at all. So, it is with much thanksgiving that we brought Ben to God for Baptism and for his blessing. We are amazed by God's goodness to us and that he brought us through that time with the help of friends, family and terrific support from our church family in Maryhill.

With a new member in the family, we have found ourselves constantly adjusting to change, especially with Finlay now reaching school age and the wonders of Primary 1. We are asking ourselves a whole new set of questions. How do you give equal care and attention to a school boy, a new born and little Rachel (3 ½) – stuck in the middle? Who would be a middle child! Rachel, just in case you have not heard her, is shouting loudly for attention and the house is rarely an oasis of calm. One thing is constant – there is constant challenge and review and the need for a new plan. We've used up Plan A, B and C! If you are familiar with Plan D do get in touch ...

Coping with change is not exclusive to my family, but also can be seen in the Church and community here in Maryhill. This area – a parish of over 14000 people – has seen enormous changes over the years and the community continues to change and throw up new challenges for the Church to respond to. This last year we saw schools close and this year community centres under threat. Within our Church we saw a change in Ministry, a hard working Nominating Committee and everyone stretched pretty much to breaking point. We saw a superhuman effort in the work of the Deacon, Jim Hamilton and by many who took on roles where they saw jobs needing done.

I have observed everyone taking a breath and surveying the scene around them.

What's next? Do we feel our energy returning? What can we do now? I suppose, I hope that we might consider ourselves a bit like willing parents. We must work out systems of coping, prioritising and meeting the needs of our growing family. I am relieved to say, as a man lacking any kind of regular sleep, that we do not do this alone. Whether it is raising a family, or raising a caring and Christian Community, God goes with us and is there to give us strength and courage to help and to guide.

Your prayers and support are very welcome as we reach out to our community and live and grow in faith just a hop and skip away from you all in Milngavie.

Fort Rocky

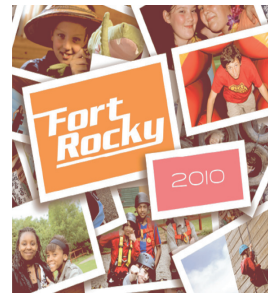

This month we start a series on Stewardship based on an article written by Dr Nigel G Wright, Principal of Spurgeon's College.

The idea of stewardship

Jesus told a parable about a man who wanted to go on a journey. He summoned three servants together and gave one of them five talents (a unit of currency), another two and the third, just one, in the expectation that they would make a profit out of what he had entrusted to them. The ones who had five and two talents managed to double their investment. But the third was afraid of losing what he had, so he dug a hole and put it in the ground. When the master returned he called them all to account. Those who had put the talents to good use were commended and rewarded with larger responsibilities. But the one who had done nothing was as a "wicked and lazy servant" and thrown into "the outer darkness" (Matthew 25:14-30).

This parable introduces us to the idea of stewardship. Everything we have has been given to us by God. We are not all

given the same amount, and we do not all have the same ability. In that sense there is a diversity of gifts (1 Corinthians 12:4). But we are all equally expected to do something useful with what we have, however much or little. We are not to be lazy.

In fact, not being bothered enough to do anything at all, is as much a form of sin as active wrongdoing. Human beings in general, and Christians in particular, are expected to make something out of their lives. We are stewards of what we have been given. In the fullness of time there is to be a reckoning and each person will be held to account for what they have made of themselves and what has been given to them. It would be good to have something to show for our lives.

Since Christians are conscious of living as those accountable to God and do so with a sense of proud gratitude, the idea of being stewards should shape our whole approach to the world, the church and our own lives and possessions. This can be worked out in a various ways which we will explore in the next few editions of "Life".

Mission School to be established in Glasgow

The local mission activities should be worked out locally, but could include starting a Healing Room, Healing on the Streets, Street Pastors, prophetic evangelism, Light and Life, treasure hunting team, Alpha course, a 24/7 house of prayer, a streetreach team.
