



A visit to Strathyre during the Summer saw me pausing at the memorial to Dugald Buchanan, the eighteenth century poet, evangelist and Gaelic scholar. The inscription describes him as 'A true poet, an eloquent man and mighty in the Scriptures.'

When I read that I began to wonder what it takes to be described as 'mighty in the Scriptures'. Well, I was awarded my gold Scripture Knowledge badge in the BB and I had to pass Bible exams when I was training for the ministry – but somehow I don't think that qualifies me as 'mighty in the Scriptures.' If you are interested enough and have a good memory then you can gain the reputation of 'knowing your Bible.'

A bit more is demanded. Perhaps you need to understand the message the Bible is trying to convey? That would certainly be progress but it is possible to understand ideas without them making much difference to your life. I can understand the arguments for vegetarianism but that has not as yet led to a change in my eating habits. I can understand the arguments for pacifism but I personally cannot embrace that as a personal discipline or a political imperative. I can understand the arguments of various politicians without being moved to vote for them.

Surely being 'mighty in the Scriptures' means knowing the God who has 'breathed out' the Scriptures, receiving the truth in those Scriptures, applying that truth to our own lives and being willing to share that truth whenever we have the opportunity. Whatever hopes an aspirations we have for this Church 'season' let's pray that we can become a community which is 'mighty in the Scriptures.'

Friendship Circle was set up 13 years ago and has gone from strength to strength. There are over 30 members who meet every Wednesday in Milngavie Town Hall. Some members are housebound and come in wheelchairs in the bus provided by Social Services. Others are ferried to and fro by a team of volunteer drivers. These volunteers are mainly from Cairns, St Luke's and St Joseph's and don't all attend every week.

Most members are referred to the group by friends who are already members, by home helps and by doctors. When the application form is returned, a member of the committee will visit to assess that the circle will be suitable for them. If this is so, and they live in Milngavie, their name will be added to the waiting list.

On arrival at 10am the group has tea, toast and scones, followed by a time to chat to one another and maybe have a game of dominoes. A proper three course lunch is provided by Social Services and enjoyed by all. The afternoon programme is quite varied and may include quizzes, singing, even dancing and sometimes guest entertainers. Afternoon tea with home baking provided by yet another team of volunteers is served before the members leave at 3.30pm. There are several outings planned in the course of the year.

Members pay £2.50 each week to cover the cost of food. Other than this, we depend on donations and any available grants.

Male helpers are urgently required – able bodied men who are retired (or otherwise able to help for a few hours on Wednesdays) should give serious thought to this worthy form of community service.

TRIBUTE TO THE LATE ARCHIE MCKENZIE

One of the words which was used most frequently about Archie was the word 'gentleman'. People have their own ideas of what that means but in Archie's case there was no doubt that he communicated a sense of gentleness and graciousness that the world often lacks. Archie would stand when a lady came into the room; he had the knack of giving children his undivided attention; and he could make a point effectively without giving offence or being in any way disrespectful. Like the Sunday after the morning service when he pointed out to me that I had forgotten the Lord's Prayer.

It could be also said that he was a Presbyterian gentleman. The Church of Scotland was one of the great passions of his life, and he had an amazing grasp of her history and traditions. He read historical tomes that had defeated many a Divinity student, and the result was that he was deeply convinced of all that Presbyterianism had contributed to the Nation and to the World. But having said that, Archie could never be said to be narrow or exclusive in his churchmanship. He cherished a spirit of brotherhood towards all the followers of the Lord, and some of his happiest memories of Kildrum Primary School were the earliest days where he had a close association with Father Jaconelli, the local priest.

That's why we can say above anything else, Archie was a Christian gentleman. He was always at his best when engaging with people and his attitudes were firmly set on the highest values of the faith. Memories of Archie will always include his patience, his tolerance and his compassion. All of which combined to make him a conscientious elder who supported his people through difficult times, and who generously entered into their times of celebration.

Archie knew about both these extremes on a personal level. His early teaching career was interrupted by the war, where he saw action in North Africa among other theatres of conflict. Like many of his generation he spoke very little about his experiences, but there can be no doubt of the intensity of it all.

On the positive side he could look back on a distinguished teaching career, culminating in the Head Teachers post at Kildrum, but more especially his family life that was built with his relationship with Gladys. They were married in 1960 and the arrival of Gregor and Rhona made the family complete. The circle grew wider though with Gregor's marriage to Anne, and a new experience for Archie followed when he became grandfather to Michelle, Sean and Sarah. And the expansion didn't end there. There was double blessing when Rhona's Rachel and Rebecca were born.

It is to all of them, those who were closest to Archie, that our hearts go out. Their sense of loss is the greatest, but we can all share with them the hope of the Gospel which meant so much to Archie himself.

St Paul's Lunch Club and Mid Week Service - by Alastair MacLeod

When? When did it all start? I believe that it was about 25 years ago that a group of enthusiasts in St Paul's had the idea to start the Lunch Club.

Why? The Club was meant to serve two groups especially, in the church and community. One was the elderly people who would enjoy a get together over a light lunch in the church hall. The other was the children from the local Primary school, who would enjoy a change from School Lunches – and also might find their way to the church in a broader sense.

What? The meals served have changed a bit over the years, but the basic idea has remained pretty constant. Of course the new kitchen allowed greater enterprise than was possible in the restricted area previously available, and Environmental Health requirements have brought complications which in the early days were not dreamed of (even in nightmares). The idea has always been to provide a light lunch, and we serve home made soup of a variety of kinds and tastes, a very well filled roll with varieties of cold meat, salmon, egg, cheese, as well as salad for those who wish it. Then there is a buttered scone or pancake and several kinds of tray-bakes to choose from. Not to mention the cup of tea or coffee. We usually manage to meet the needs of special diets, especially if we know about them beforehand.

The children get something rather less, more to their liking and at less cost.

Where does it all come from? Not only are there a group of ladies and gentlemen who give their time to come and arrange things and serve on Wednesdays. But there is another group who give time and talents in making the scones and tray-bakes, giving their services free, possibly about once or twice a session, by arrangement.

Cost? Well, there's an interesting question. If you went into a tea shop, you certainly wouldn't get this amount and quality for less than £5, and you may well pay up to £10. We don't exactly charge, we suggest a donation of £1. That's all! And 80p for the children. Considering that the Club opened so many years ago and said 50p, maybe it's time we charged more. It's an interesting question, because already we give about £400 each year, to the church itself or to church supported charities.

All this is because of those mentioned above who give free services. So you see the coins come into the box when our "customers" and the "helpers" pay for their lunches, but there is a real sense that the charitable giving also comes from those who bake and work in the Hall for free.

Charity? In fact the Lunch Club is a Charity in two ways. In a sense it is a charity for the children and the elderly. In another sense it is a money earner for external and internal charitable givings. This is why I am divided on what we really should now be suggesting as a donation. We would hate to put off anyone, but on the other hand, looked on as a provider of charitable givings, are we undercutting? Of course there is absolutely no reason why helpers and customers should restrict their givings to £1 – some give more already anyway. It's really a question of what we should suggest.

Help? Yes we always need help. A few years ago when we ourselves joined the helpers, there were a number of others who joined also. But folk are always ageing, and we now need others to join us. Some helpers are there every week, but it is also good if two people arrange that the one or the other will be there every week. Ladies who can do an occasional tray bake; Ladies who can work as a member of the team in the kitchen; Ladies who can serve at the tables and chat to the "customers"; Gentlemen who can put out the tables, and help to set the tables if necessary; Gentlemen who will serve the children and perhaps ensure that order is kept (although that has hardly ever been a problem).

Other places? There are several other lunch places in Milngavie. They all provide something different and so we do not wish to be regarded as competing. We do something which is rather unique and which many people like.

You? I wish to put it to you that this is a very worthwhile enterprise, and it is worthy of your support. Don't take the attitude that you are letting yourself in for something. Rather take it as a wee opportunity, which you will be able to enjoy. If you would prefer a specific area then we will arrange that. If you just want to help somewhere, then we will talk to you about the areas of greatest need at present.

Mid week Service? Why have I left this to the end? That really is all wrong. I myself finally decided to help at the Club because it had this service following. It's short (15 minutes), to the point and if one of the ministers takes it, as is usual, then its very worthwhile. Not everyone comes to the service, but from time to time I try to mentioned it, just in conversation.

Customers? Yes there's lots of room, and we look forward to welcoming many new "customers" this year. Do please consider joining the fellowship, and enjoying the lunch. And we are also glad to see people who are not elderly or children, perhaps on a day off work or if they are working locally.







WCC General Secretary meets with families of Korean hostages

In a gesture of support toward the families of the Korean hostages being held by the Taliban in Afghanistan, Rev. Dr Samuel Kobia, general secretary of the World Council of Churches (WCC), visited them while on a trip to Korea. Of the 23 Christian humanitarian workers who were taken hostage on 19 July, two have been killed by their captors, while two others were released yesterday into the care of the international Red Cross and Red Crescent societies

The Thursday night prayer group is fed by testimonies and stories of Christians around the world and we repeat in digest a recent excerpt from Frontline – Open Doors Magazine:

Dr Rebekka Zakaria, Ratna Bangun and Eti Pangesti were released from Indramayu State Prison in West Java on 8 June 2007 after serving two years out of a three-year sentence imposed for running a Sunday School attended by local Muslim children.

They were freed at 6am, three hours earlier than scheduled, to avoid confrontation by Muslim radicals who had planned to wait outside the prison. Tears were shed by the other female inmates as they said goodbye to the ladies, who they will miss greatly.

Outside the prison gates many people waited to welcome the three mothers, who proudly displayed their release papers amidst great jubilation. The ladies will be on parole until February 2009, and until that time have to report to Cirebon prison administration office every month. They must be very careful not to be accused again of the same charge.

Thank you for praying in the run-up to our three sisters' release (Open Doors was told). Would you please continue to pray for them? They ask you to pray that they will adjust to family life again and that their families will stand strong in the Lord. Please also pray that their church congregation will find a place to conduct its worship services.

Pray also for our local community, teachers and Sunday school teachers as kids flock back for the new session, for our ministers and new youth worker, Gemma Stoddart as they seek to bring Christ's teachings to us all.





Church Picnic



I become a Christian when I was ten years old, at an Easter Holiday Club in Bearsden Baptist Church. I started seriously following God when I started attending St Paul's when I was fourteen. This was where I began to learn how to actually live like a Christian everyday.

Have you had specific training - if so, what?

As I mentioned above, I have an honours degree in theology. I also attended the International Christian College for one year, to study their degree in Youth Ministry.

However I do have many years of experience in children and youth work. I worked for Milngavie Churches @ One and the Scottish Bible Society. I am currently involved locally with chairing the Scripture Union Action Group, which I have held for four years. I have also organised many holiday clubs, children's event, youth groups and volunteered at residential camps.

What age groups will you be working with?

My title is St Paul's Children and Youth coordinator, which means I will work with all children and young people. The age range will be all children who attend school, both primary and secondary.

We've had various short lived youth projects over the last few years - what's your plan to make this one more sustainable?

I believe the nature of youth work is that many things can be perceived to be short lived. However this does not have to be negative. Teenage years are when changes happen constantly; with every week that goes by there are new fads and trends. This fact means that many projects which are popular one year with a group of young people can take a dramatic turn the next year. Nevertheless I believe we have to continue to reach out and nurture young people. Employing me will help to do this, as there will be a constant person for the young people to know and relate to within St Paul's, which will hopefully lead to the building up of good relationships.

How do you plan to engage with the teenage group especially?

Initially I will try to get to know the young people who already attend St Paul's. A monthly youth event for local churches is planned to start in the autumn. This will enable our young people meet other young people who are attending different churches. In the future this task will, I hope, be addressed more specifically.

Have you got any specific events lined up yet?

A similar event to Timetravel will run in October, called BOB (Bring On the Bible). However I will be around most of the groups that already meet in the church (see 'St Paul's CYP for more information).
