Dear Friends,

A Very British Coup was a television drama that made a big impact in the late 1980s. It told the story of Harry Perkins MP, a former steel worker from Sheffield, who becomes Prime Minister in a socialist government. His radical policies are generally popular with the country at large but he is constantly frustrated by unsympathetic civil servants, smeared by an influential media mogul and undermined by governments of other countries. Eventually forces opposed to Perkins come together in a bloodless coup to have him removed from office.

It was first-class drama with the late Ray McAnally excelling as Harry Perkins. It raised a serious question, however, which is still being asked and ought to be of concern to us all: who governs Britain? Is it our elected representatives or is it people we have never heard of who are in the background but press the buttons and pull the levers of power?

Contributions to that debate are still flowing from the pens of political and social commentators and rightly so. Whatever conclusions Christian people might come to we must always hold the perspective of the Scriptures on political power. Psalm 2 presents a picture of a God who is above political machination but is ultimately in control of the flow of human history. The Apostle Paul is clear that political authority is part of God's plan for the stability of the nations. Jesus boldly proclaimed to Pilate that he would have no power if it were not given 'from above.'

It is a great encouragement for us to know that whatever plans emerge from political manifestoes there is a Deep Story unfolding. Jesus would call it the building of God's Kingdom, the transformation of the whole of God's Creation, restoring it to that state where suffering and injustice and death have no place. In the meantime, certain individuals are entrusted with the welfare of the nations. They are given power 'from above' and are responsible to God for the exercise of that power. In the end, the big question will be how close a government has been to the Deep Story.

This is why we are commanded in Scripture to pray for those in authority. Paul writes:

'I urge, then, first of all, that requests, prayers, intercession and thanksgiving be made for everyone - for kings and all those in authority, that we may live peaceful and quiet lives in all godliness and holiness. (1 Timothy 2: 1-2)'

Not that we are to endorse everything a government stands for but that a vision of the Kingdom might be kept before all those in authority along with an awareness of their awesome responsibility.

How many folks nowadays remember the terrible Biafran/ Nigerian civil war in the 1960s? Last night our group discussed the book we had just finished reading - Chimamanda Ngozi Adichie's novel "Half a yellow sun".



No-one could read this book without being deeply moved and troubled.

The author brings together strong characters from the different factions involved in this war. Her writing made us stop and realise the extent of the unbelievable suffering which the people endured. She made the reader care deeply about how her characters were pulled apart by events and how they stood up to the changes in their lives

Everyone in our group agreed that although this is a hard read at times they would definitely recommend it as a compassionate and thought provoking novel and several of us said that they would read it again. What came over strongly in our discussion was how the author had shown war to be a pointless and unsuccessful way to solve a nation's problems

Our next book is Gilead by Marilynne Robinson and it promises to be a good read. We dont meet again till Tuesday 16 June.

Munro challenge: reach a summit, raise money for Christian Aid





The Moderator of the General Assembly has

called on the Church to get behind a major fundraising drive for Christian Aid by signing up to his Munro challenge.

On Saturday 2 May, Rt Rev John Chalmers and Rachel Hutcheson, National Youth Assembly Moderator, will be leading by example by climbing Ben Lomond. Mr Chalmers said: "This day out is much more than a fundraiser – it is an opportunity to join me and Rachel on a pilgrimage during which we will contemplate some of the mountains that Christian Aid and others are still trying to climb on their way to creating a world that is just and fair and which gives the poor a chance to climb out of poverty."

As they prepare for their trek, the two Moderators are calling on congregations across Scotland to reach the summit of 69 other Munros to mark the 70th anniversary of Christian Aid. Ms Hutcheson added: "I really hope everyone who is able to will climb with us in order to raise as much money as possible for a charity I am very proud to support. If people are unable to support John and me in person then I'd be very grateful if they could sponsor us.

New Partnership Projects Unveiled by Church of Scotland Guild

SIX new partner projects – are set to benefit from a three-year partnership project with the Church of Scotland Guild. The new set of project partners are:

- Street Pastors (500 of them operate in 20 towns and cities across Scotland providing care on the nighttime streets principally at weekends)
- Care for the Family (working with those facing family difficulties)
- a Christian Aid project in Bolivia (caring for the environment and seeking to educate about climate change)
- Mission International's Haiti Project (working in one of the poorest countries in the world)
- a Feed the Minds project against FGM in Kenya (tackling complex cultural and social problems)
- Prospects, an organisation which supports people with learning disabilities in churches.

Guild Projects Cont.

Previous partnerships have raised substantial six-figure sums for the projects supported by the Guild during the three-year initiatives.

Announcing the projects for 2015 to 2018 under the theme of 'Be bold, be strong!, Guild General-Secretary lain Whyte said: "These wide-ranging project will allow the Guild to reflect on inclusion, poverty, gender inequality, climate change, relationships and pastoral issues."

By the time you read this we should all be together again in Japan, apart from Daniel who is continuing the third year of his Law course in Brisbane. It has been an encouraging time spending a few months in Scotland, touching base again with churches, friends and family. We are hoping that our next time back here will not be as long as six years from now! Actually we are hoping it will be in the second half of 2017 which does not seem that far away. However, plans can change...

The school year in Japan is now in full swing. Alistair has started his final year of elementary school and Calum is in his final year of Junior High school which lasts three years. The next stage is a different school (also for three years) and everyone needs to sit difficult entrance exams for these schools early next year. It is a complicated system that is new to us as our older two boys did not go through Japanese high school. Calum is hoping to stay on with his present football club and move into their youth team which means a three year commitment. The news from Matthew is that he has decided to follow Daniel and will go to Glasgow to study Law.

There is quite a lot going on over May and June in the OMF Japan world as we put in place a new organisational structure with a new leadership team. Changes are not necessarily easy so there will no doubt be a number of bumps and challenges along the way as we implement the new system. But we hope that this will be something which enhances our ministry in Japan and gives everyone the support and freedom they need to engage the people of Japan with the gospel. There is so much still to be done and so many people still to be reached with the good news of Jesus. OMF is just a small part of that, but as the largest mission group in Japan, we want to play our part responsibly and work well with the Japanese church and local pastors to help God's kingdom expand in that land.

Dear friends,



Lodging House Mission AGM Report

On Wednesday 8th April I attended the AGM of the Lodging House Mission. The support of churches, trusts and individuals was acknowledged and thanks expressed. It was pointed out that 2014 was the first year since 2008 that the LHM had not benefitted from six figure donations (lottery or legacy). As a result there have been two redundancies resulting in an even greater emphasis on volunteering. Anyone considering this should bear in mind that it can be for short periods. All are welcome.

The golf day, normally a big fund raiser, didn't take place and, because of the Commonwealth Games, the cycling event was organised last minute so not as well attended as usual. In spite of the drain on reserves it is very much hoped to maintain the same level of facility to the service users.

After the business meeting we heard from a volunteer, a young man planning to train to be a priest and spending a gap year with the LHM, a service user describing his life and the benefits and friendship he has found in the LHM, and lastly an employee. She explained that no day is the same. She is called upon to be an advocate, give advice, assistance and friendship. The latter is so Important within the mission as Ioneliness is a big aspect for the service users.

All the contributors were very impressive including the young choir mistress who finally lead the LHM choir singing two Scottish songs for us.
