Dear Friends,

It is one of the most enduring images in football. The game is flowing end to end, the result is still in doubt, and the Coach calls a substitute from the bench. With his hand on the player's shoulder, brow knitted in concentration, he gives his final instructions before sending him into the action, hopefully to make a difference.

This came to mind when I was reading Psalm 80: 16-18:

'Your vine is cut down, it is burned with fire; at your rebuke your people perish. Let your hand rest on the man at your right hand, the son of man you have raised up for yourself. Then we will not turn away from you; revive us, and we will call on your name.'

This is obviously a time of great distress in Israel, when enemies have overrun the land and caused great devastation and suffering. The Psalmist feels a sense of the judgment of God upon His people. But he is not without hope. There is one close to the Lord, upon whom His hand is laid, who can come to the people to revive them and restore them to His favour.

The Psalmist may have in mind a future King of Israel but it is not hard for us to see in this great hope a foreshadowing of the coming of the Messiah, the Son who is at the right hand of the Father, raised up from the people of Israel, sent to reconcile all things to the Father.

It is upon Him that we must focus mind and heart as 2017 begins. The Church in the Western world faces many challenges but the One who was the great hope of Ancient Israel has come. He has given His Spirit to the Church and promises never to leave her until He has achieved His great purpose. Therefore it is with confidence that we can pray with the Psalmist:

'Restore us, O Lord Almighty;  
make your face shine upon us,  
that we may be saved.' (Psalm 80: 19)

### Traidcraft



First of all I must thank everyone for the great support you have given to Traidcraft sales over all the years since 2001 when we first introduced a stall in the large hall after each morning service. We have sold thousands of £'s worth of goods, averaging about £3000 a year.

By using Traidcraft we know that all profits are ploughed back in to expanding the number of new projects that can be started often in very small ways, thus empowering families to work and to make a reasonable living so that they will be able to feed and educate their families. Traidcraft was the Christian response to poverty & lack of opportunity seen in so much of the 3rd world. Two of the major projects over the past few years have been Guatemalan honey, & Clean & Fair palm oil cleaning products.

From January our stall will still be operating but mainly just once a month. The main reason for this is that the Coach House in Balmore is closing there, but opening sometime in the New Year within Milngavie - hopefully in Gavin's Mill - & as they keep a far bigger stock than we could possibly do, - all fairly traded - I thought it time to wind down a bit.

However, for all our regular customers, (& any irregular ones!) we shall continue to take orders, as I remain the designated 'fair trader'. Our first opening date in January is the 22nd. Please come & visit our stall then.

## Christmas Tree Festival

We are delighted to report that this year's Christmas Tree Festival was a resounding success with a huge number of visitors and our biggest amount ever raised for charity. The total came to almost £3,800 and since each of the charities is quite small, the donation they have received - £1,262 - will have a considerable impact on their finances.

Two of the charities are based in Milngavie; these are Carers Link which supports carers of all ages in East Dunbartonshire in a variety of ways, and Clober Farm Spinal Injuries Unit which offers respite both to those who have suffered from spinal injuries and also to their families. The third charity is the Angel Tree Project of Prison Fellowship, a Christian organisation which works among prisoners; this particular project provides Christmas presents for the children of prisoners, many of whom would otherwise go without.

We are very grateful to members of the congregation who volunteered very willingly - as ever! - to steward in the church, to bake and to serve in the tearoom. As in previous years the tearoom played a vital part in the enjoyment of our visitors as they chatted over tea and coffee and the delicious home baking produced by the members of all the local churches who work together to organise the event.

Many members of St. Paul's were involved in decorating some of the beautiful trees which were on display. This year we had thirty -three and we think it was the best display ever, also because the trees themselves were so lovely even before being decorated.

We must not forget the music programme which included several new names this year. We enjoyed a wide range of music performed by musicians from many walks of life. The age range went from toddlers and pre school children who sang very engagingly, through all ages up to some retired members of the community who make the most of their free time by producing beautiful music for others to enjoy. We had a jazz band, a ceilidh band, guitarists, organists, pianists, clarsach players, singers and several others to whom we are most grateful.

Of course we must also say a big 'thank you ' to everyone who supported the Festival by coming to visit it. Without your attendance and your generous donations all the preparations would have been to no avail.

### Dear Friends

One thing that is well-known about Japan is that it is a country which is prone to natural disasters. Earthquakes happen regularly and each year there are typhoons which cause mudslides and overflowing rivers. Then there are occasional volcanoes erupting and the risk of a tsunami in the event of a powerful earthquake under the sea. Through this past year, significant numbers of people have lost their lives due to earthquakes or typhoons. In one poignant case, a typhoon caused a river to burst its banks and the water poured into an old folks' home leaving many residents no chance of escape.

Recently there have been several powerful earthquakes in the Greater Tokyo area, home to some 42 million people if the whole of the Kanto area is included. It is a reminder that one day Tokyo is once again due 'the big one'. It remains to be seen how much that is mentioned as we approach the 2020 Olympics. The buildings here are remarkably resilient due to stringent building regulations but many older houses would not withstand a strong earthquake.

One thing that we do see in the aftermath of any natural disaster is a remarkable community spirit among local people, with many working together to clear up, and generally a sense of perseverance. We have also seen recently many churches and mission organisations coming together to help by sending teams of volunteers to give help in areas where it is needed.

A stoical spirit and helping one another to rebuild is good. However, for those who lose loved ones suddenly, there is of course deep pain. One thing that is often harder to do is help people to rebuild their lives and find hope and comfort amidst the tragedy that has happened. That is where the gospel comes in. We can 'demonstrate' the gospel through actions; but we also need to 'share' the gospel by words and at times just by being with hurting people in silence. May God use the Christians here to be salt and light in these times.

## World Mission

### From Zambia to Leith: A Twinning Visit

Recently we were glad to welcome Mildred Syangandu and Matildah Mfula from the United Church of Zambia (UCZ), and Reverend Iain May from South Leith Parish Church to the Church of Scotland offices. Mildred and Matildah were visiting South Leith Parish Church as part of their twinning programme.



Mildred is currently training to be a minister at the UCZ university college, whilst Matildah works as an Executive Assistant to the Vice Chancellor of the university. Both were enjoying their visit, but were finding the weather particularly cold! A highlight for both of them was attending the Remembrance Service. They were touched by the respectful way in which the service was conducted. They attended South Leith's Food Bank which is held in the Church, and were surprised to find that some people in Scotland are struggling to buy food. The idea of a food bank is something they will take back to their congregations in Zambia.

Mr May has learnt a lot from the twinning visit, and was particularly fascinated to hear about the high numbers of people who attend church in Zambia. He was also pleased that Mildred would be working with his congregation in the future, as she will be coming to Edinburgh to complete her probation before becoming a minister.

### Home Secretary to Investigate Visa Refusal

A controversial decision to refuse visas to two Pakistani Christians who want to visit Glasgow is to be examined by the Home Office.

Prime Minister Theresa May said Home Secretary Amber Rudd would be willing to investigate the case.



The Conservative Party leader made the pledge after Kirsten Oswald, MP for East Renfrewshire, raised the issue in the House of Commons. The decision has disrupted the Church of Scotland's plans to build a partnership with the Diocese of Hyderabad in Pakistan.
