

Life at St. Paul's Milngavie

May 2021



Dear Friends,

I am writing this on the day when I come out of shielding. Having been designated by the Scottish Government as one who needed to observe extra restrictions in my lifestyle I can now look forward to more room for movement and personal contact. This means that I will be able to record services from St. Paul's and also lead the restricted worship on the Lord's Day.

Shielding has been a frustrating experience but there is a shielding mentioned in Scripture which is entirely positive. In Psalm 3: 3 David says:

'But you are a shield around me, O Lord;
you bestow glory on me and lift up my head.'

At a time of great pressure in his life David takes comfort from the idea of being shielded by his God. As a military man he would know the importance of a good shield so it is not hard for him to imagine God providing even more expansive protection. This is just one of 19 such references in the Psalms but the idea is prominent throughout Scripture. In many instances we see the faith that God can provide physical protection for His people in times of danger. But there are other texts which in a sense go deeper. God protecting the soul from harm. Here is Psalm 28: 7:

'The Lord is my strength and my shield;
my heart trusts in him and I am helped.'

I can only think of two references in the New Testament. Paul speaking of the Christian's armour in spiritual warfare writes:

' . . . take up the shield of faith, with which you can extinguish the fiery darts of the evil one.' (Ephesians 6: 16)

Peter speaking of the default spiritual state of the believer describes those 'who through faith are shielded by God's power until the coming of the salvation that is ready to be revealed in the last time.' (1 Peter 1: 5)


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Neither Paul or Peter could ever claim that they had always been shielded from physical danger but they were convinced of a deeper shielding. They trusted that even in their worst of times they could be sure that their souls were safe with God. That is to say nothing would ever affect their place in the heart of God, His good purpose for them in this life and their fulfilment in the coming Kingdom. Jesus says:

‘My sheep listen to my voice; I know them, and they follow me. I give them eternal life, and they shall never perish; no one can snatch them out of my hand.’ (John 10: 27-28)

The believer is in the hands of the Good Shepherd and no one or nothing will ever prise us away. We are called to regard our souls as shielded against the spiritual dangers of sin, death and the devil. It is in this great truth that we can go forward with faith into the unknown future.

Dear Friends,

Japan is known as a group-orientated culture. From a young age, children are taught to work and play in groups, and often to put the needs of the group above their own. One of the most important groups is the family. In Japan you introduce yourself with your family name first and then your first name, which reflects the order of importance.

When coronavirus case numbers started to rise earlier this year, the church leadership sent a message to all the church members. In particular, it asked those over 75 to discuss with their families whether they could still attend church in person. Several older members were asked by their families not to come, in order to protect their health.

One of these is Mrs M, an older lady with a very simple faith who loves attending church. Two years ago her family took her for a treat to a hot spring hotel for a night, but she was very cross that it would mean missing a Sunday morning service! Her family have asked her not to come to church whilst case numbers remain high, and she has respected their wishes, though she finds it very difficult.

Last week, we were surprised to find Mrs M joining in the church's online prayer meeting. She has never been one for technology. Yet she made the effort to learn how to use Zoom so that she could join in. When the pastor asked her how she was doing, she mentioned the daily devotions that we have been writing and sending to church members for the past year (I write one each week). She said, "When I used to read the Bible, I couldn't really understand it. But now that I have the daily devotions, I can understand what I am reading."

Given that I still find it challenging to write in Japanese (it is easier to speak), this was such an encouragement to me, and I hope to the others who write the devotions as well. But it was also an encouragement to see Mrs M's love for being part of the church family, and her perseverance, whether to learn new technology or with reading the Bible even when she has found it hard to understand. I thought you might feel encouraged by her example as well. Please continue to pray for Japanese Christians to be able to persevere in their faith and grow in their love for Jesus and desire to tell others about Him.

Ways to give to Christian Aid Week this year

So, in an effort to try and do something positive this year, here are some ideas regarding how to donate.

1. If you have a magazine delivered by your Church visitor or elder, you will find the usual Christian Aid envelope inside. If you are attending church personally there will also be envelopes placed around the vestibule for your own use. You can use this for your donation and refer to numbers 4 & 5 of this article to find out how to return the envelope.

2. You can go on line to www.christianaid.org.uk/appeals/key-appeals/christian-aid-week and give a donation there.

3. If you are reading this online, simply click the hyperlink (in blue) below or you can copy and paste the following <http://envelope.christianaid.org.uk/envelope/milngavie-ca-group> into your internet browser. This will take you to a local page for Milngavie Christian Aid

4. If you don't have access to an envelope and that's your preferred way of giving, phone me, Alex McEwan on 0141 384 0274 and we can make sure an envelope is delivered and can be picked up at a later date.
(usually out delivering cards so its no problem!)

5. When you have your envelope and your donation, there will be a box, on a Sunday, in the vestibule, for you to post it through, or if you are passing the church just put it through the church letterbox and Hugh will then place it in the donation box for you.

Developing skills for income generation in Nepal

One of the biggest consequences and negative impacts (amongst many) of Covid-19 and the lockdown in Nepal last year has been the seasonal migrant workers helplessly returning to Nepal with an uncertain future.

Remittances of migrant workers are the only source of income for thousands of families. These households experienced a sharp decline in income during partial and full lockdown last year. The problem is massive but the United Mission to Nepal (UMN) has taken a small initiative in the villages of Doti (West Nepal) to help and encourage such migrant returnees.

UMN is working on developing the workers' entrepreneurial skills, thereby opening doors to an alternative source of income generation. Since November last year, after the lockdown was lifted, we have already seen around 40 migrant returnees of one village set up small enterprises. They are secure, working hard and happy to be earning in their land.

Debt repayment or vaccine?

Did you know that countries in Africa are spending three times more on debt repayments to banks and speculators than it would cost to vaccinate the entire continent against Covid-19?

This includes Zambia, a country where we already hear from our partner church, the United Church of Zambia, that a vaccination programme has not yet begun. Zambia and other countries have asked for a break from these loan repayments, so they aren't forced to choose between saving lives and repaying loans. So far, they have been refused.
